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A LETTER, FROM YOUR PASTOR

Seven Mile Road.

We have had another beautiful year together and have many reasons to be grateful to God. As you will remember, at the start of 2021 we had just come inside for worship in our new auditorium and were finding our footing together in the wake of all that had gone on over the previous year. As I have met with leaders of churches around the city and country, I have been amazed and grateful for the unique ways that 7MR has operated in health and unity despite the many challenges that the past couple of years have presented. We have not earned this outcome with our wisdom or godliness, but we have certainly received a flood of mercies from our God in heaven. Some tangible evidence of those mercies are as follows:

- Our house churches multiplied from 26 to 40 through the season of COVID. New leaders emerged as our community continued to participate in the rhythms of the early church, loving and tending to one another and the community around them. This has been the central component of our ministry from the start and was strengthened in stunning ways through the pandemic.
- Local outreach has been strengthened significantly as our house churches have been outfitted with Local Outreach Coordinators. 7MR is pushing back darkness and brokenness as we are tending to the hurting throughout the city.
- Our global mission impact has been strengthened significantly this year as a result of our deepening relationship with City to City. After having helped plant 2 churches in West Africa over the last 5 years, our community leaned in this year to help create Hub Cities in West Africa and Northern India. The advent giving was about \$400,000 (still being tallied at the writing of this letter) and will be given to these strategic global endeavors!
- We have settled into our Together For the City campus and are actively building a kingdom hub in the heart of Houston. The collaboration and ministry happening pleases the heart of God as we are longing for the church to be one and the city to be whole. It is invigorating to have 4 congregations, Hall Counseling, Sharpen Recovery, and the Houston Church Planting Network all laboring alongside each other. Furthermore, there will be some exciting new connections made as Fostering Family and Bloom Concierge Physical Therapy move in at the start of the new year!

There is more to celebrate, but suffice it to say that God is on the move and it is our immense joy to be instruments in his hands. In and through it all your elders and staff are convinced that we have only scratched the surface and are poised and ready for a significant movement of God's presence and power in 2022. We want to be a community that doesn't merely celebrate the gifts of God but hungers for the heart of God. Lean in with us. Be affectionately with God. Wait with anticipation for his joy-inducing nearness. As we do, we will take significant strides towards our mission to embody and declare God's redemptive story to every Houstonian!







CREATING SPACE AT A HEALTHY PACE








Over two years ago, the shepherds of the Central Heights House Church met with our staff team to dream of the path forward for their growing group. Melissa Buce and Brock Hedgecoke were faithfully tending to 27 individuals and recognized the tension of desiring two seemingly opposing pursuits. Their group had already multiplied just a few months prior and hoped for a lengthier stretch of stability. Yet, they longed for greater degrees of intentionality, which required the reproduction of the safe space they stewarded. Slowing down long enough to pray and discern together, we spent the next several months training up several leaders and casting the vision repeatedly for "those who were not yet in the room". The Spirit granted us the wisdom to move at a slower yet healthier pace then. Now, God is tending to and growing 3 House Churches within blocks from one another. In and through this pandemic, these groups have fostered hope and wholeness for those who now belong in the room.



WASHINGTON CORRIDOR HC

An exciting development for the Washington Corridor House Church in 2021 has been the addition of the weekend rhythm of spending time at a park together with the aim of meeting people who have never heard the good news of Jesus Christ. These "evangelism" Saturdays" have organically emerged from a desire in the hearts of several men and women in this House Church to share the gospel as a regular part of their lives as followers of Jesus. They simply meet at the park to play frisbee or some other game, start conversations with people, and as they have opportunities, they invite the people they meet to read a story about Jesus from the Gospel of John. This leads to gospel conversations about who God is, the reality that all people are sinners, the truth that Jesus came to save sinners, and what it means to respond to him in faith. The result is that a large group of their friends who don't know Jesus have gladly attended a frisbee outing, game night, or movie night, all of which have been followed by a Bible study in which they heard the gospel. There is a buzz around this House Church as they continue to grow in their love for one another and for the city of Houston. We pray that their story of growing as disciple-makers, which continues to be written, will inspire and encourage other House Churches to take similar steps of faith in their neighborhoods.


ON A MISSION

Unity amidst diversity must continue to be a reality for us, if it is ever to be one for our city, nation, and world.





LAKE CHARLES. LA TRIP







On August 20, 2020, Hurricane Laura made landfall in Lake Charles, Louisiana as the strongest hurricane on record in the state. Miles of destruction caused power outages, food shortages, and irreparable damage to many in the Lake Charles community. After hearing of a need for short-term workers in Lake Charles, a group of 13 individuals from Seven Mile Road traveled to Louisiana for the weekend to serve alongside local church leaders. During this three-day weekend, the group served in various capacities, with assignments ranging from delivering groceries, tree removal and lawn cleanup, and gutting a flooded church building. The weekend was not only an encouragement to those that were directly impacted, but also served as a unifying experience to the 7MR team. We long for everyone who calls Seven Mile Road home to engage with those in need. We pray that as we look ahead to 2022, all will heed the call to serve the least and lost by joining a short-term trip!



NEVER TOO FAR
